Stage 5.

Finally, from the bottom of the cross, draw a line down and round the outside of the whole shape anti-clockwise, curving round the bottom left-hand point, then continuing between the existing lines clockwise to the bottom right-hand point.


How a Celtic Labyrinth is designed



Draw a cross, and at each corner of the imaginary containing square, draw a dot.



From the top of the cross draw a horizontal 'S' curve around the top right point, then a semi-circle to the top left point.



Stage 3.

From the right-hand end of the cross, draw a curve round the top, then curving inside the semi-circle, finishing up at the top right-hand dot.



Stage 4.

From the left-hand end of the cross, draw a curve up over the top, down and round the bottom right point then up over the top and down to the bottom left point.
